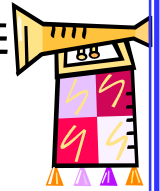

## From the Pastor: June 2009

It has been a while since our last newsletter. Some logistics problems and not having an internet service at the church have held us back. We have used the Yahoo groups to keep members informed, but we also realize the necessity for a church newsletter. If you wish to contribute information or an essay about what we are doing or planning, please feel the power to submit an article for the next issues.

At the Metro DC Synod Assembly this year, we memorialized the ELCA Social Statement on Human Sexuality. The statement still needs to be passed at the General Assembly later this year to become affective. We have copies of the statement and they have been available since October, last year. One of the key phrases is about the bound conscience of each and every Christian on how we live with one another in relationships.

What does it mean to be called by our conscience? How are we bound by our conscience? Sometimes it is God alerting us, that we are straying from the truth. Sometimes it is our bound-conscience calling us to look out for our neighbor, above our own self interests. Hopefully, we are bound by the Word of God as it speaks to us in today's world of confusion and tension. This is what the ELCA has been struggling with for over nine years. Who are we, and what are we about, as brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus? We are responsible to God and to our fellow Christians as we trudge the road of life.

It is easier to see the faults in others and so easy to ignore our own sins, faults and defects of character. It is easier to place our standards upon others, but we fail to see that we don't live up to them ourselves. The actual world is not as it

ought to be. It is flawed, wrought with error and problems, yet it is also filled with goodness, mercy and truth. God is the eternal judge.

Reinhold Niebuhr wrote, "We have noted that self-deception and hypocrisy is an unvarying element of all human beings." In short, we are all capable of sin. We are all capable of lying to ourselves through justification and rationalization. We are all capable of judging others. We set our own criteria for living upon others, sometimes without telling them, and then judge them. God does not call upon us to judge our brothers and sisters in Christ. God does however call us to love one another, to forgive one another and to work together for the sake of His church.

During the Season of Pentecost, let us remember that in reading and studying the Bible we sustain our Christian faith and fellowship for service to the church and to the world. Use the Christ in our Home booklets, join a Bible study group or start one in your home, read it with others and use the power of the Holy Spirit to help you discern how the Scriptures help us daily in our lives. Come to VBS this summer and join other adults as we look at movies and their relationship to our theology.

Let us all look to the future with hope in our hearts. May God watch over you and keep you in the palm of His hand.

**From the President**



Dear Good Samaritans,

We are truly living in the risen Christ. Only after experiencing the fear of closing our doors were we truly open to listening to the unexpected ways God is working in our midst. We are on a journey for which only God knows our destination. In the last year and a half we have gone from hopeless despair to celebrating the ministries God has brought to 10110 Greenbelt Road.

Our music went from dividing our congregation to unifying it. Our music ministry welcomed Judy Marvel and brought her back to living in the joy of the Lord after years without Him. Our secretary, Kitty, is experiencing God's love in a new way. We enter our worship space knowing that God is truly among us and doing wondrous things in ways we could not have imagined. He has called us to grow in our faith.

Having exhausted our savings, God led us to rent our space to other congregations and individuals. What seemed like a necessity has been His work and His will being done in ways we didn't know how to do. Worship services are held in our building Wednesday night and Saturday morning and evening in Spanish by the Seventh Day Adventist Congregation. Worship is celebrated Sunday mornings from 8-10 am by Prince of Peace Church. We worship in the Lutheran tradition at 11 am on Sunday mornings. At 2 pm, People of Faith International hold their worship service, followed by fellowship at 6 pm. Additionally, they have a Friday evening service. There are seven worship services per week in our building! The Word and worship are truly abundant here.

During the week, until June 18<sup>th</sup>, we have an after school tutoring program that provides affordable care and support for elementary age children in our community. This Christian faith based company brings snacks and prayer to the tutoring sessions and they will run a "camp without walls" here in the summer. In that, the campers meet here and go on a field trip every day to return here by 6 pm. I have met the teachers and some of the students. This is truly a ministry filling a great need in our community by doing God's work. Our building has become the

community resource for children that we wanted, in spite of not having enough Good Samaritans to run the programs!

VBS is coming July 12 – 16. We are a place for the local children to come experience God's love. Laura Hunter is directing it and could use any help you can give. We are truly blessed with abundance.

Our treasurers, Melissa and Jessica, see the abundance of ministries and have both grown in faith as God has provided each time we needed additional funds to pay salaries or utilities. Summer is a difficult time for churches as giving falls off on average 25%! Now, more than ever, Good Samaritan needs you to support your church family as we recover and strengthen from the adversity of 2007! If you've been in service you've seen new faces. If you've stopped in on weekday afternoons you've seen children in our building. If you drive by frequently you've probably seen youth and families playing basketball. God is working here and we blindly follow Him in faith, called to give back to Him what he has first given us: ourselves, our time, our talent, and our resources.

I invite you to join us for a special congregational meeting (pot luck) on June 28<sup>th</sup> after service where we will gather as faithful stewards to discern where we are on our journey and what we must do to be faithful disciples of Christ.

## Information from the Treasurer

As Treasurer, I would like to keep you informed about our financial situation here at Good Samaritan. Monthly Treasurer Reports are on file in the church office as part of Council Meeting Minutes. You may check the reports at any time if you would like up-to-date information. Contact me if you have any church finance questions.

Council approved many rentals to help reconcile income with expenses. For the most part, this has been a tremendous help to keep us current on our bill paying. We seem to be depositing good amounts into our checking on the weeks when we have special events during worship. This is to be expected, and is quite normal. However, we cannot schedule special events each week simply to get people to show up at church and to bring a check!

Some people have committed to a larger amount of giving. Given our nation's current economic situation, this is a very difficult decision for our congregants to make, yet it is happening.

We all know that as we approach summer, we approach the period of the year that giving decreases. People are on vacation; and using their money for these vacations. People do not attend church as often, and sometimes their giving is simply forgotten. I challenge each member to make their giving a priority this summer... mark a date on your calendar and send a check to the church if you will be away. You can do this weekly or monthly, whichever is the way you usually do your giving. You can even set it up in online bill paying!

Remember, the bills do not stop coming, just the people do when they are on vacation.

A couple of weeks ago, I asked the congregation to pray about our giving and our finances. And I also asked them to consider which of our current bills they may be able to cover. The response was good, and I know that people care about keeping our church in active ministry. I now ask you to keep those prayers coming. We are trying to build beyond just being able to pay the bills into a congregation that has programs to support its ministries.

As of the beginning of June, we have a few bills on which we are behind. We now owe 2 months of mortgage, \$2458.00. We owe Synod \$840.00 for the Synod Assembly, Bishop's Convocation, and Mission Leadership Retreat. We are behind on paying our benevolence for April and May. We owe about \$200.00 for some reimbursements from our clean-up day. We owe \$250.00 to Concordia Publishing for an annual renewal fee. And there are a few other bills totaling about \$300.00 for various items. None of these items are frivolous or even optional. They are simply bills necessary to carry out the work of the church.

We have a little more than \$1500 in our savings. About half of this will be used to pay quarterly taxes in July if we don't bring that amount in through our offering. In other words, we do not have a lot to fall back on if we get into trouble.

I paid some bills today, and we were left with \$13.80 in our checking account. We have a deposit to be made still from our offering today, and it is not quite enough to cover our salaries which are due in one week. We will have another offering by then, but don't forget that we still have all of the previously listed bills that are due. And more bills that are due later in the month. It is quite a juggling act to figure out which bills to pay, and which ones to put off.

Our parsonage is in need of a lot of work. The basement is full of mold, which is being worked on by Kitty and her family. Kitty donates a tremendous amount of time and money to our congregation's needs. We all need to thank her for her generous donations.

Judy, as well, has done more than share her musical talent with us. Many of you have heard her stories of giving until it hurts, not knowing how she would be able to pay a toll to visit her son, and God supplying her with enough money to get through life. What a testimony to tithing! Judy has also given back a great portion of her pay from us. We also need to thank Judy for her generosity!

My intent is not to scare any of you, make you think that we are doomed or any such thing. My intent is to make you aware that we have needs right now, and to ask you to make my job less burdensome to me and to Council by giving consistently and giving a little more than you have been. Thank you to those who have responded already!

Pray for me and Jessica (also your treasurer), pray for our congregation, pray for our ministries together. May God help us to be less dependent on outside sources of money and to celebrate the things we are able to do with what we have!

## **“Stewardship is what we do after we say we believe”**

Over 45 years ago this congregation was formed and become a viable congregation, put together a constitution. Our congregational constitution states in Chapter 6.03b “This congregation pledges its financial support and participation in the life and mission of the ELCA.” When we pass a budget each year, it is with the faith and hope that every member will support the life, mission and vision of this congregation for the upcoming year. If we believe that our mission is what God is calling us to do, then we need to step up to the commitment to support that mission.

Bills come in regularly each month, like gas, electric, phone, and pest control. Along with these we have periodic bills that must be paid in order to maintain our building, like insurance, water & sewer, maintenance of the property. We also have three people on payroll whom we owe regular salary and benefits. The money for these bills and wages comes from our donations each week and we attempt to supplement that with rental income. However, we have been on a downward spiral of giving over the past 5 years. Our savings and endowments have been depleted and there are no reserves.

If we wish to remain viable as a congregation we must make sure that we continue to support our purpose by making regular contributions especially over the summer months. While planning your vacation also plan on sending your weekly donation by mail or giving it to another member who can drop it in the offering plate on the Sunday you are away. And if possible, please find it in your heart to give more generously to keep God's mission alive and fruitful.

## Bishop Hanson responds to tragic event in Wichita

ELCA Presiding Bishop Mark S. Hanson issued a statement in response to the May 31 murder of Dr. George Tiller at Reformation Lutheran Church, an ELCA congregation in Wichita, Kansas. Pastors Lowell R. Michelson and Kristin M. Neitzel serve the congregation. It is part of the ELCA Central States Synod, led by Bishop Gerald L. Mansholt. In addition to this note originally sent to synodical bishops, a [press release from the ELCA](#) containing additional details is posted.

Dr. George Tiller and his wife, Jeanne, were gathering with the people of Reformation Lutheran Church to worship and to celebrate Pentecost--the coming of the Holy Spirit to God's people. It is unconscionable that Dr. Tiller, who was serving as an usher and welcoming people to worship, should be brutally murdered.

In the wake of his death we pray that the Holy Spirit will comfort his family and all who mourn. We pray for the courage to be peacemakers, rejecting violence as a means of resolving differences. We trust God's promise that neither death nor life nor anything in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 8:38-39)

On behalf of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, I express gratitude to God for the witness of the people of Reformation Lutheran Church and for the pastoral care being offered by Bishop Mansholt and pastors Michelson and Neitzel in this tragic circumstance.

Today we cry out "Lord have mercy!" And we are so bold to proclaim and believe Jesus is the resurrection and the life. (John 11:25)
